So here is a brief snapshot of what we have accomplished together. I will keep my comments short, but please read through the full Annual Report.

Sheriff's Election

As you all know, we have a new sheriff. ALADS played a significant role in getting Sheriff Villanueva elected. We threw significant resources and support behind him, enabling him to successfully run a superior campaign. Many of you have told us that morale within the department has begun to turn around - a result we specifically targeted in this effort.

ALADS New Legal Defense Plan

We spent the last year and half working on one of the most important benefits that ALADS offers our members: our new Legal Defense Plan, which we included in the previous month's issue of the Dispatcher. I hope you removed the plan and gave it a thorough read. The plan explains in detail what type of coverage you are entitled to as a member of ALADS. Just like policy, you should read and understand it before you need it. You will notice that we have added a new benefit which is a reimbursement option for suspensions of five

(5) days or less. Please read the following carefully, so you will be able to make an educated decision if and when the need arises. Although we offer a five-day reimbursement, I would suggest you fight your discipline due to the specifics of the department's system. If you do not fight the discipline, you may be held from a promotion or transfers in the future.

It is important to tell you that ours is the most generous and best legal plan available to law enforcement personnel. We currently spend about 38% of our budget on legal services.


ALADS Logo



Your Paycheck is Getting Bigger



ALADS Endorses Alex Villanueva for Los Angeles County Sheriff

ALADS announced its endorsement of Alex Villanueva in the November 2018 election for Los Angeles County Sheriff. Villanueva shares ALADS' issue priorities, has over 30 years in the department, and has a demonstrated track record of advocating for deputies.

Use of Force Legislation is Bad Public Policy

The passage of AB 931 subjects peace officers to "Monday morning quarterbacking" that will lead to criminal charges for use of deadly force. If it is found during the multiple reviews that different tactics – including retreat – may have changed the outcome, the officer will be subject to criminal prosecution, even if deadly force was reasonable at the time of the incident. ALADS Directors along with leadership from other POAs walked the halls of our state capital to inform legislators that AB 931 was problematic and succeeded in stopping the bill from being passed in its current form. Look for a new version of this bill in 2019.




ALADS Announced New Legal Defense Plan: ONLY AVAILABLE TO ALADS MEMBERS



From Hostile Legislation to a New Legislature Composition, 2018 Was One of the Most Challenging for Law Enforcement

As the calendar rolls into 2019 and the California Legislature returns to Sacramento to begin the new Session, we take a look back at some major issues from 2018 and prepare for what is coming next.

Last year was undoubtedly one of the most challenging in the history of the peace officer profession. Hostile legislation introduced to diminish the safety and wellbeing of law enforcement officers raised the temperature of the Capitol for much of the year. These polarizing proposals forced legislators, public officials and other interest groups to unveil their public stance on fundamental officer safety issues and criminal justice reform.

Despite the lopsided progressive majority in both Houses of the Legislature and the high likelihood of passage of most of the troubling bills, ALADS rose to the challenge. ALADS hammered the problematic bills at every opportunity and at every level of government, against all odds. ALADS works with a full-time legislative advocate to ensure that the Association is a critical factor at all key meetings, aware of all introduced, amended or proposed bills that affect the profession, and is a constant presence in the State Capitol to build invaluable relationships with our allies in the Legislature.

Last year, ALADS was instrumental in the eventual outcome of a number of high profile bills. Whether it was stopping a bill in its tracks, negotiating amendments to soften or narrow the impacts of a detrimental bill heading for passage or lending the Association clout to support friendly measures, 2018 was a busy year.

Assembly Bill 931 (Weber) Officer Use of Force

Without question, the top priority of the last Session was Assembly Bill 931 (Weber), which would have statutorily required officers to consider all available alternatives prior to taking action to defend their own lives or the life of a bystander. The measure would have exceeded the current longstanding standard that was established by the Supreme Court in Graham v. Conner; which clearly allows for the use of lethal force if the officer deems it "reasonably necessary".

Our leadership at ALADS did not mince words on their analysis of this bill, and appropriately labeled it the "Cop Killer Bill". We communicated early and often to the Legislature that the measure presented officers with an impossible task that ignores years of training on how to identify risks as well as a lifetime of instincts that guide the officer on how to react in a split second when their life is potentially in danger.

Our strong presence on this measure in the halls of the State Capitol, as well as on the airwaves and in the print media was enough to bring this fight to a screeching halt last year. When this measure was introduced, we were told privately by several legislators that this measure would be next to impossible to stop. What politician would vote against the argument that a cop shouldn't kill if they have other options? Despite this, we were able to cut through the rhetoric and misinformation and educate legislators in a relatively short amount of time.

We are currently, and have been since AB 931 died, continuing to work with the proponents of this bill, as well as our like-minded allies, in anticipation of another attempt to legislate "use of force" in 2019.





Senate Bill 1421 (Skinner) and Assembly Bill 748 (Ting): Records

Two related measures were introduced last Session that were aimed at increasing "transparency, accountability and public trust" in law enforcement by allowing the public to have access to previously confidential department records.

In the case of SB 1421, the bill was heavily amended to lessen the impact on peace officers by limiting the release to "critical incidents". ALADS was successful in significantly narrowing the scope of the disclosure to discharge of a firearm at a person and incidents involving great bodily injury. Further, the measure was also amended to allow for redacting the identity of the peace officer involved in these incidents through the use of a balancing test.

The measure requires the release of the investigatory files and disciplinary action for any sustained complaint of sexual misconduct or dishonesty that rises to the level of affecting a criminal matter. ALADS argued, and we still believe, that this policy will be abused to harm innocent peace officers for personal, political or emotional reasons.

Governor Brown opted to sign this measure into law during the final hours of the last day to sign bills. ALADS made every possible attempt to dissuade him from enacting this measure into law. Although the bill is very narrow in scope and is argued to only expose "bad" officers; we anticipate the policy discussion to push forward and expand as the information rolls out.

As for AB 748, this measure will require, by July 1, 2019, every public agency that uses body cameras to release footage of critical incidents within 45 days, as long as the release does not compromise the integrity of an ongoing criminal court case. We opposed the measure

both for policy reasons and for local control concerns. ALADS argued that local agencies should be permitted to determine the rules and guidelines that best fit the needs of their jurisdiction and their constituents. AB 748 posits a "one size fits all" model that certainly will not apply appropriately across the State.

ALADS urged the Governor to veto this measure in favor of a "local control" model for body camera footage release. However, he opted to sign the bill "as is".

The bill contains some protective language to prohibit and delay the release of footage during an active criminal investigation, but it remains to be seen how smoothly this process will play out.

Senate Bill 1279 (Bradford) Double the Base Term

ALADS actively opposed this bill, which would have dramatically reduced the sentences for criminals with multiple victims. As drafted, the bill would have given what amounts to a bulk discount in any criminal case with multiple victims.

For example, someone convicted of sexually assaulting more than three children would have had a sentence of only eight years. We educated legislators about the fact that this measure would have denied justice to crime victims.

Shockingly, this measure was able to navigate the Senate process as well as the Assembly Public Safety Committee. During the last weeks of Session, ALADS dialed up the opposition effort to get the attention of the Assembly Floor to demonstrate the injustice created by this change to law. We successfully killed this bill on the Assembly floor in one of the most lopsided vote counts in recent memory. The bill was only able to muster 10 votes with 50 legislators voting "no"!





This Year

As detailed several months ago, the Legislature that reported for duty in 2019 has swung even further to the left than their 2018 iteration. The Assembly is now comprised of 60 Democrats to 20 Republicans; and the Senate is made up of 29 Democrats and 11 Republicans. A lopsided disparity to this level has not existed in California for either party since the mid 1800's. Our new Governor, Gavin Newsom, is a former Mayor of San Francisco.

That being said, ALADS will continue to fight the good fight not only on behalf of deputy sheriffs and district attorney investigators, but also for the public that peace officers are sworn to serve and protect. ALADS will continue to be front and center at every hearing, vote and debate that affects public safety. For legislators that have questions or concerns, ALADS will and should be a constant presence in their offices and in their districts to make sure that they are casting votes and



Professional Services are consultant services related to public relations, accounting and auditing, general and labor issues, and other related costs.






