I would like to believe the reason for the almost uncontested election is because the ship is headed in the right direction, and members feel that if it ain't broke, no need to fix it.



available, there was a representative from our department dressed in his best class A uniform. As you can guess, once again this year, our representative was not wearing pink patches. I find it insulting, embarrassing, and downright aggravating that the LASD will not allow its personnel to wear pink patches. The sheriff just will not allow it. Other agencies have gone as far as wrapping their patrol cars with pink to highlight breast cancer awareness month. Some fire agencies even have pink fire engines for the month!

Jim McDonnell is very personable. I've had dinner with him and sat in meetings with him. I even like him. However, he is not the leader the department currently needs. ALADS disagrees with many of his decisions and the direction he is taking the department. Let's start with the so-called Brady List that he pushed into the court system. ALADS has been to court and beaten his case not once, but twice! The sheriff has appealed the decisions, stating he just needs clarification from the court. We feel strongly that the court has given him clarification.

At a time when other departments are progressing in the uniforms they wear, our department is regressing. Instead of

moving forward with better materials and technologies, equipment at stations is old and worn. Many times, it simply does not work, causing delays in deputies' daily tasks.

On the other hand, Alex Villanueva has said he would gladly allow deputies to put pink patches on their uniforms for the month of October. Is that a small thing? Not if you lost a loved one to breast cancer. It is a simple gesture of goodwill toward nationwide recognition of a terrible disease.

When it comes to uniform materials, Alex said he would authorize a 21st century uniform for deputies to wear. He described it as breathable synthetic materials to keep you cool, as well as outer vest carriers to make you more comfortable and take pressure of your back. Pants would be a 5-11 BDU type. Alex feels our current "1950's" uniforms are impractical for police work. ALADS must agree.

When asked about tattoos, Alex said tattoos are not a big deal, they are a cultural norm, and a tattoo is not indicative of bad behavior.

Interestingly, Villanueva openly stated he would eliminate 15-17 high-ranking department members if he is elected. He feels that the sheriff promoted many of the Tanaka / Baca supporters. When it comes to SB 54, Alex said he will not let ICE inside the jail. Rather, he will

transfer deportable felons to ICE outside the jail and out of view from other inmates in the bus bay at IRC. Alex will do away with the so-called Brady List. Villanueva said he will stop the flow of unit level investigations and opt instead for PLEs which will help to correct issues. He feels there are far too many unnecessary investigations underway.

Most importantly, Alex Villanueva will make recruiting and retention of deputies his number one priority.

Whatever the outcome of the election, ALADS is committed to continue to challenge the department and fight for the rights of deputies and district attorney investigators.



or the month of October, Investigators in the District Attorney's Office put on their pink patches in honor of Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Each October, more than 300 public safety agencies across California participate in the Pink Patch Project. This is the third year for the District Attorney's Bureau of Investigation. "Our message is public awareness," said Lt. Robert Maus, who led the effort.

"People ask about the pink patches and, as a part of the conversation, we encourage early detection of breast cancer through annual mammograms and regular doctor visits," said Maus, pictured on the left with Secretary Linda Martinez and Senior Investigator Norman Weisenstein.

he Legislature has officially concluded the 2018 Legislative Session. The Governor wrapped up his role in the process by signing 1,016 of the 1,217 bills that cleared both Houses. He vetoed the other 201 measures that he did not deem worthy of a signature into law. The 16.5% veto rate is his highest out of the eight terms he served as Governor for the State of California.

Since 2018 is the second year of the two-year Session cycle, all actions are final and there is no opportunity for measures to move. The Assembly and Senate will return on December 3rd for a one-day swearing-in Session and will begin to introduce bills for consideration in 2019. The swearing-in Session will be attended by incumbent legislators who will be joined by the winners of the November election for the first time.

Although we consider 2018 among the most difficult years that law enforcement has ever faced, we anticipate that next year will be no different. We should expect the reintroduction of measures that we were able to kill and

further proposals to expand or build upon some of the watered-down criminal justice reforms that we were unable to stop last year. We are hard at work during the interim educating Legislators and fighting misinformation that is continuing to be spread by the other side.

In the meantime, here is the final outcome of bills of concern to ALADS:

Assembly Bill 931 (Weber) Use of Force By Peace Officers

This bill has been correctly referred to as the "cop-killer" bill. AB 931 would have overturned decades of settled case law concerning the standards governing when an officer may appropriately use deadly force. The bill also exposed officers to a 20/20 hindsight standard that could have triggered criminal prosecution of that officer. Put simply, this is the most blatant anti-law enforcement, anti-officer safety bill ever put before the Legislature. ALADS played a major role in killing this bill. We partnered with numerous law enforcement unions and associations in our effort to fend off a media blitz engineered by the proponents. We partnered with the LAPD to set up and operate a Forced Option Simulator (FOS) in the State Capitol to allow Legislators and staff to walk in the shoes of a peace officer for 15 minutes. ALADS launched a full media attack on AB 931 that included radio ads, full-page ads in key newspapers, and social media ads to high propensity voters in targeted districts. Our President, Ron Hernandez, anchored two "tele-town halls" in critical Senate districts that garnered the participation of over 3,000 listeners. Most importantly, Ron flew to Sacramento and walked the halls of the Capitol on your behalf to meet face-to-face with Legislators to ensure that the intensity of our opposition was loud and clear.

Due to our relentless lobbying efforts and because the measure was so contentious and divisive, the Senate eventually opted to hold the bill and not bring it up for a vote on the Floor. Although we view the outcome as a victory, we fully expect the other side to be back with a similar bill next year. We are currently leading the discussion with our statewide law enforcement partners to strategize on how to steer the discussion next year. We will be at the table on behalf of rankand-file law enforcement and will never commit to legislation that puts officer safety at

State Legislative Corner

Senate Bill 1421 (Skinner) Peace Officer Personnel Records

Although this bill was heavily amended to lessen the impact on peace officers, the bill still retains the basic thrust of undermining the confidentiality of an officer's personnel records even where his or her conduct is entirely within departmental policy. We were successful in significantly narrowing the scope of the "no-fault" disclosure to discharge of a firearm at a person and incidents involving great bodily injury. Further, the measure was also amended to allow for redacting the identity of the peace officer involved in these incidents through the use of a balancing test. Despite these amendments, we still asked Governor Brown to veto this bill.

The measure continues to require the release of the investigatory files and disciplinary action for any sustained complaint of sexual misconduct or dishonesty that rises to the level of affecting a criminal matter. We argued, and still believe, that this policy will be abused to harm innocent peace officers for personal, political or emotional reasons.

The Governor opted to sign this measure into law during the final hours of the last day to sign bills. We made every possible attempt to dissuade him from enacting this measure into law, but the support of a key law enforcement management association gave him cover to sign the bill. Although the bill is very narrow in scope and is argued to only expose "bad" officers; we anticipate the policy discussion to push forward and expand as the information rolls out.

Assembly Bill 748 (Ting) **Body Camera Footage Release**

This measure will require, by July 1, 2019, every public agency that uses body cameras to release footage of critical incidents within 45 days, as long as the release does not compromise the integrity of an ongoing criminal court case. We opposed the measure both for policy reasons and for local control concerns. We argued that local agencies should be permitted to determine the rules and guidelines that best fit the needs of their jurisdiction and their constituents. AB 748 posits a "one size fits all" model that we are certain will not apply appropriately across the

We urged the Governor to veto this measure in favor of a "local control" model for body camera footage release, however, he opted to sign the bill "as is".

The bill contains some protective language to prohibit and delay the release of footage during an active criminal investigation, but it remains to be seen how smoothly this process will play out.

Status: Signed into law, effective January 1st

Senate Bill 923 (Wiener) **Eyewitness Lineup Identification**

This bill, which would have significantly altered the standards for eye-witness identification protocols, was significantly amended at the behest of the Los Angeles District Attorney to address the provisions that were objectionable. As a result of those amendments, the Los Angeles District Attorney's office changed their position from "oppose" to "support". The amendments delay implementation of the bill until 2020, provide discretion for officers in determining whether to video the witness' identification, and provide that the bill does not apply to field show up procedures. Their amendments also allow for the information gathered during an identification procedure to be deemed "admissible" regardless of whether the blind or blinded administration is used; as long as that fact is disclosed to the court.

With the support of the Los Angeles District Attorney and the neutral position of the California District Attorneys Association, the Governor signed this bill into law.

Status: Signed into law, effective January 1st



Assembly Bill 3131 (Gloria)

Acquisition of Surplus Military Equipment

This bill would have virtually eliminated the ability of law enforcement to participate in the Federal 1033 acquisition of surplus goods by requiring a public hearing by the local agency's governing board that would have taken longer than the federal statutory deadlines for local agencies to accept federal surplus property. The League spearheaded a coalition of law enforcement organizations in strongly opposing this bill.

As a result of our opposition, the author drastically amended the bill to eliminate the pre-approval process in its entirety and reduce the bill to a post-1033 surplus property reporting requirement.

The original version of the bill would have the effect of disqualifying local law enforcement agencies from benefiting from these often free and inarguably beneficial equipment and supplies by ensuring that agencies in other States, who do not have this hurdle, to apply for and win the bids for the surplus.

The Governor agreed with our arguments and opted to veto this measure, effectively killing it. In his veto message, the Governor cited "local control" and indicated that he considered the measure "too broad" in its application.

State Legislative Corner

Senate Bill 1186 (Hill) **Surveillance Equipment**

This measure would have required approval of the governing body of a city or county before an agency may acquire surveillance technology. Our consistent position on this bill from the outset has been that conducting a public hearing detailing the vendor and specifications of surveillance equipment to be deployed by law enforcement will provide a roadmap for criminals to avoid or undermine the effectiveness of the tools. We were successful in killing this bill in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

Status: Died in Assembly Appropriations

Action: Active Oppose

Senate Bill 1437 (Skinner) Felony Murder

This bill, carried by the Senate Public Safety Chair, will undermine California's felony murder rule. This bill would prohibit a participant in the perpetration or attempted perpetration of one of the specified firstdegree murder felonies in which a death occurs from being liable for murder, unless the person was the actual killer or the person was not the actual killer but, with the intent to kill, aided, abetted, counseled, commanded, induced, solicited, requested, or assisted the actual killer, or the person was a major participant in the underlying felony and acted with reckless indifference to human life.

The measure would apply retroactively, and would also allow those who accepted plea deals to reapply for a new trial to determine their guilt or innocence under these new rules. This is a huge issue for prosecutors, since the acceptance of a plea negated the need for an initial trial at that time, so the evidence and materials needed to convict may not exist.

The Assembly Floor debate on this measure was lengthy and contentious and demonstrated the growing angst amongst the Democrats in the lower House regarding

criminal justice reform. Not surprisingly, the Governor signed this measure into law. He was making personal phone calls to the Floor urging "ave" votes.

There is potentially a challenge to this policy since it may violate a previous ballot initiative that was approved by the voters in 1978 (Prop 7, Death Penalty Initiative). It remains to be seen if the challenge will be launched and whether it will be successful.

Other Issues

Senate Bill 10 (Hertzberg) Rail Reform

The California Legislature designated "cashless bail" as their #1 priority for the year back when the Session was originally commenced in 2017. The bill was sponsored by the ACLU and social justice groups who drove the message that cash bail is inherently unfair and creates a bifurcated system that results in different outcomes for those who committed the same crimes depending on their ability to pay for bail (or not).

The measure was initially successful in clearing the Senate last year, but met a tougher road in the Assembly who opted to kill an identical measure on their Floor.

The measure was eventually substantially amended in 2018 to provide "cashless bail" but through the use of three "tiers" determined by a risk assessment. The first tier would be released immediately, the second would be released under "supervised recognizance" and the third would be held until trial without opportunity to pay bail. The group that we should be concerned with is the second "tier" offenders, who presumably would be under the supervision of law enforcement (probation and peace officers) ensuring their return for trial and potential sentencing. The bill is not prescriptive for these responsibilities, so we should anticipate clean-up legislation.

The bail bonds industry is already hard at

work gathering signatures to put an SB 10 referendum on the ballot to repeal it from the law. This effort would push the enactment date of "cashless bail" until after the 2020 election, if they are successful. We will report when and if they meet

their signature thresholds.

Senate Bill 1279 (Bradford) **Double the Base Term Sentencing**

ALADS actively opposed this bill, which would have dramatically reduced the sentences for criminals with multiple victims. As drafted, the bill would have given what amounts to a quantity discount in any criminal case with multiple victims. For example, someone convicted who sexually assaulted more than three children would have had a sentence of only eight years. We educated members about the fact that this measure would have denied iustice to crime victims and successfully killed this bill on the Assembly floor in one of the most lop-sided vote counts in recent memory. The bill was only able to muster 10 votes with 50 Members voting "no"!

Assembly Bill 186 (Eggman)

Legal Injection Sites

This measure was a two-year bill that we were previously successful killing on the Senate Floor. Prior versions of this bill allowed a list of

municipalities to allow for the creation of "legal injection sites" where illegal intravenous drug use would be permitted to take place. Those who would choose to frequent these safe havens would be permitted to consume their drugs without any recourse, registration, questioning or responsibility; and then would be free to go on their way.

We argued against this policy, which would have undoubtedly resulted in increased crime at and around these locations. We also foresaw issues with transit of contraband and substances to and from these locations; and did not receive adequate public safety assurances that those who would be permitted to depart these sites while high on drugs would not pose a danger to the community or themselves in the immediate vicinity of these locations.

The Author opted to with the strong support of the local representatives, amend the bill down to a single city (San Francisco) and push forward. She was successful in securing the votes to get the bill off the Floor.

Despite the fact that the bill now only affected one city in Northern California, we continued to oppose this dangerous and ill-conceived bill.

The Governor, after much deliberation, sided with law enforcement and opted to veto the measure. In his message, he indicated that AB 186 was "all carrot and no stick".

Status: VETOED by the Governor

Senate Bill 905 (Wiener) 4 a.m. Drinking Bill

For the second year in a row, Senator Wiener from San Francisco introduced a measure to extend the hours for serving alcohol from 2 a.m. to 4 a.m. in selected jurisdictions. Among the cities included were Los Angeles, Long Beach and West Hollywood.

The measure was opposed by law enforcement agencies, among others, who foresaw issues with overlapping the "last call/end of night" population of drivers with early commute traffic at 4-4:30 a.m.

The measure was debated through the process and eventually presented to the Governor,

who promptly vetoed it. In his message, he indicated that he thought "two more hours of mayhem" were not a pressing public need and were not worthy of a change to law.

Status: VETOED by the Governor

Assembly Bill 1810 (Committee on Budget) Mental Health Diversion

Our efforts working to undo the impact of AB 1810 (which was slipped through the Legislative process by being buried deep in a bill that dealt with another topic entirely), appear to have achieved some partial progress. Under AB 1810, a defendant can evade responsibility by claiming that they have a mental defect that allegedly gave rise to their misdemeanor or felony charges by being sent to a diversion program, where, after a two-year period, the defendant could have their charges dismissed in their entirety. Senate Bill 215, by Senator Beall, was signed in law by the Governor. This bill will eliminate broad classes of felons from eligibility for the mental health diversion processes of AB 1810, including those on trial for murder, rape and several other sex crimes.

Status: Senate Bill 215 signed into law

Looking Ahead

2018 was clearly the most contentious in decades. Our success in defeating AB 931 was extremely hard earned and required our full efforts along with the cooperation and teamwork of labor and management working together with the same message and the same goal. We don't always come to agreement with all of our public safety allies, but when we do it is a powerful force.

We know that the ACLU will be back to attack the profession next year. They are targeting law enforcement in a constant public relations smear campaign that favors criminals over victims. This will again be the scenario public safety will face in the 2019-2020 session. We have to be prepared.

Detective Magana

Prevails in Arbitration and is Taken Off the Bench

n 2016, the Critical Incident Review Panel ("CIRP") decided to issue a field restriction to Detective Magana (aka "bench" him) based on the number of shootings he had been involved in over the course of his 33-year career with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Det. Magana had been involved in six prior shootings, with the last one taking place approximately seven years earlier. None of Det. Magana's shootings were out of policy. Each of the shootings were thoroughly investigated and determined to be justified. In fact, Det. Magana was even awarded the Medal of Bravery for his actions during the last shooting. The Department took the position that the decision to restrict Det. Magana from working in the field was part of a risk management measure designed to limit its exposure to civil liability and adverse public scrutiny. Ultimately, Det. Magana was denied a meaningful opportunity to present a defense or attend the CIRP

meeting, and was removed from the field.

In response to the unjustly imposed field restriction, Det. Magana immediately contacted ALADS and a grievance was filed on his behalf. At the first two steps of the grievance process, ALADS representatives met with command staff and presented well-reasoned arguments in opposition to the field restriction. When those efforts fell on deaf ears, ALADS referred the matter to Rains Lucia Stern St. Phalle & Silver to aggressively pursue the case in binding arbitration, facilitated through the Los Angeles Employee Relations Commission.

After three days of hearings, the arbitrator issued a binding opinion ordering the Department to remove the restrictions and allow Det. Magana to return to his regular field duties. Additionally, the arbitrator found that the process used by the Department to restrict Det. Magana's field duties did not comply with due process.

Finally, the arbitrator found that the decision to restrict Det. Magana's duties was not supported by the evidence and the decision was arbitrary, capricious, and without a rational basis. After receiving the arbitrator's opinion, the Department returned Det. Magana to the field in the first week of September. This is the first decision to be issued in connection to the practice of benching deputies and it will certainly have an impact on future cases involving similar facts.
