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

The work of protecting our communities continues to be an uphill battle; elected officials in Sacramento are laboring toward ending our ability to conduct pretextual traffic stops, without regard for the potential effect on the violent crime rate. It seems like attacks on the Peace Officers Bill of Rights and qualified immunity have become something we can just expect to see annually from politicians seeking ways to attack cops who are performing their duties. Now they're comparing hard working deputy sheriffs to gang members, something that's awfully hard to stomach for people who have dedicated their professional lives to combatting crime and criminal street gangs.

Given the current political environment combined with the ongoing budget shortfall and staffing crisis, it's easy to see why we are having trouble retaining people. At last count, we have 1,122 sworn vacancies, on top of 1,070 civilian vacancies, and people continue to leave left and right. If I ask myself why I've stayed, there are a number of reasons, but the biggest might be the men and women with whom I've worked. During my nearly 34 years on the department, it's been my privilege to work alongside and forge friendships with some truly great people. A couple of them, Jim Wheeler and Robbie Anderson, are retiring this month and I'd be remiss if I didn't take the opportunity to say a few words about them.

I've known Jim "Bumper" Wheeler for a long time, going back to our custody days at NCCF when we used to play beer league softball together. He's the kind of guy you want as a friend—always willing to go above and beyond. He has served as the ALADS President since 2020, giving his time and effort to supporting the members whenever he was needed. I've also always known Bumper to have an infallible moral compass. He's the kind of person who is going to make sure the right thing is done or die trying. You can't train that; it's just built into some people—the best kinds of people. It's been an honor to work with him, and he'll be sorely missed.

30 years. Simply put, he is, in my opinion, the best partner anyone could ever ask for. If I were tasked with building a team of deputies for a project, he'd be the first person I'd choose. It wouldn't matter what the project was. He's always been the ultimate team player, putting others ahead of himself and picking up the slack to make sure the job got done, even if it wasn't his job in the first place. Rolling around with him in a two-man car was the best time of my career. If I ever look back and ask if it was all worth it, my friendship with him alone is reason enough to say it was more than worth it. I hope that each of you have this same opportunity to develop lifelong friendships because in a job where your well-being is at risk each day, the camaraderie we build with each other allows us to cope with the stress and challenges associated with this profession.

Los Angeles County is a really difficult place for cops to work, but our shared experiences provide a solid foundation that allows all of us to work together to overcome the difficulites. If you are looking for a reason why you should continue to stay in this job, look around at the people who have your backs every day. Some of them will be your friends for the rest of your life.

STATE LEGISLATIVE CORNER

COMING THIS TERM:

WE ARE CAREFULLY TRACKING LEGISLATION THAT MAY AFFECT LAW ENFORCEMENT

The 2023-24 Legislative Session is underway with the new class sworn in and the first proposals of the year crossing the Desks in each House. By the time the dust settles on February 17, the Legislature will introduce around 3,000 proposed changes to law. Of those, historically, only around 1,000 will navigate all the way to the Governor's Desk.

In preliminary review of the measures that are "in print," there is a noticeable batch of public safety bills that trend toward reform of past progressive efforts like Prop 47 and Prop 57. Not surprisingly, the authors of most of these early-year bills are Republicans, but there are also some bold measures submitted by moderate Democrats that were previously non-starter issues for the majority party.

There are at least a dozen different bills addressing the undeniable issue of fentanyl in our schools and streets. They range from task forces to sentencing reform to mandates on public agencies like schools and libraries to equip themselves with lifesaving measures in the event of an overdose or exposure. Most interesting is a measure reintroduced in the Assembly and the Senate that will require a disclosure to first-time convicted dealers that their actions may lead to death; opening up the potential that they may be charged with voluntary manslaughter or murder. This measure was held in the Assembly Public Safety Committee last year. This year it is Authored by a freshman Republican (Joe Patterson) and a senior Democrat, Senator Tom Umberg (Chair of Judiciary). It will be interesting to watch the action on SB 44 (Umberg) if and when it is heard in Senate Public Safety.

Several measures have been introduced in response to the highly visible uptick in retail theft that has been playing out on the news and social media. The long-running debate has been the argument as to whether the brazen events are driven by the lack of a significant penalty, if caught, due to the increase on the threshold from a misdemeanor to a felony for theft (up to \$950 is classified as a misdemeanor). Again, attempts to "fix" this "loophole" have been rejected or tabled by the Legislature every year since the passage of Prop 47; in most cases the bills do not even receive a courtesy hearing. Some moderate Democrats, including Jim Cooper, pushed to have the matters placed on the ballot in 2018 (Prop 20) but were undercut at every step in the process by the progressive Governor and Legislature.

This year, it appears that the temperature has been shifting to provide the public with some tangible reform to address this issue. Unfortunately, the language of Prop 47 provides limitations on what can be amended or altered by the Legislature (without returning to the ballot), but it is nonetheless refreshing to see some Democrats pushing forward some significant changes to law to attempt to solve this snowballing issue.

Several bills have also introduced in an effort to reclassify crimes from non-violent to violent for the purposes of eligibility for early release. Human trafficking, domestic violence and others have been frequent targets for reform, but have all met stiff resistance in the Legislature.

We have also been carefully tracking legislation that affects law enforcement and peace officers. There is a growing theme in

a bill package from progressive Democrats to reassign work that is traditionally done by peace officers to other public sector employees, or in some cases to non-sworn civilians. Measures have been proposed to prohibit consensual searches (Assembly Bill 93, Bryan) unless there is probable cause of a criminal act; peace officers would be unable to stop vehicles for "low level infractions" including unpaid registration, tinted windows, headlights, taillights, and issues with bumpers, for example. The measure would also severely restrict the reasons for stopping a bicycle without a concurrent suspicion of criminal activity. Senate Bill 50 (Bradford) would also put into place a process for mailing the citation to the individual to maintain the laws against the infractions, but eliminate the interaction.

Lastly, a bill has been introduced to prohibit the use of a police dog for the purposes of apprehension, pursuit or crowd control. Other purposes, such as search and rescue as well as identifying drugs and contraband would be allowed. We anticipate a fierce fight on this issue due to the preamble of the bill, which claims a disproportionate use of K9 deployment by race.

In the coming weeks, these, and many other, bills will come into focus and give us a clear idea of how challenging 2023 will be for ALADS. While we observe a clear swing in the legislative pendulum related to certain criminal justice reform issues, there are familiar fights on the horizon over frequently debated issues such as use of force, personnel record confidentiality, and efforts to "defund the police" that simply aren't going away. We aren't surprised and are prepared to advocate on your behalf.

Please note, the frequency and timing of preventive examinations can depend on your age and risk level. There also may be additional preventive care services that your doctor suggests based on your family history and medical conditions, which is why it's important to see them regularly.

ALADS understands that members and their families may have postponed some of their preventive care over the last few years as a result of the COVD-19 pandemic. However, many facilities and provider offices continue to have precautionary measures in place to help reduce exposure to COVID-19 and other viruses. Additionally, for members who may be immunocompromised, we invite you to explore the Anthem Blue Cross app, LiveHealth Online. You'll be able to interact with providers and have access to information without ever leaving your home!

The ALADS Body Scan Benefit In addition to routine preventive care services, the ALADS Anthem Blue Cross medical plans also include no cost Body Scans for enrolled members and one spouse/dependent every 24 months. We all need to find ways to minimize the tasks in life that pull us in different directions.

Allow me to introduce you to Anthem's **CarelonRx** (previously known as IngenioRx), the service that brings convenience and efficiency to your front door.

No delivery fee: When using CarelonRx Mail, your prescriptions are delivered to your home at no cost within 5 days after your order is processed. If you need your prescriptions more urgently, they also offer faster delivery for a small delivery fee.

Lower cost: Prescription copays are \$5 for both generic and brand name drugs when using the home delivery pharmacy. When picking up at a pharmacy in person, the prescription copays are \$5 for generic brands and \$15 for brand name drugs.

90-day supplies: Ask your doctor for a 90-day refill and you can receive your 90-day supply at the \$5 copay amount. When picking up at a pharmacy in person, you would pay the \$5/\$15 copay per 30-day supply.

Public safety and supporting our deputies has been a priority of Vice Mayor Crist long before he was elected. In 2002, Crist was recruited to join the Lancaster Sheriff's Boosters. At the time, it was a small, but successful organization raising \$25,000 a year, mostly from direct contributions from local business owners.

As Crist became more involved, in 2004, he was asked to become President of the organization. Building on the old saying, 'no one can do everything, but everyone can do something,' we brought in more people from the community. When I joined, there were 7-8 Board Members. We needed to increase that," explained Crist.

In addition to those who could write a check to the organization, Crist recruited those who could donate items that could be auctioned or raffled off. For many businesses, this was much easier than making a monetary contribution. For others who love auctions and special events, Sheriff's Boosters fundraisers became some of the most popular and well-attended events in the community.

In recognition of his efforts on behalf of law enforcement, Crist was appointed Chairman of the Lancaster Criminal Justice Commission in 2008, and two years later recruited to run for City Council.

The Boosters continued to grow, eventually rebranding to serve the entire region as the Antelope Valley Sheriff's Boosters, supporting both the Lancaster and Palmdale Sheriff's stations. Signature events include their annual Casino Night which raised over \$600,000 last year, as well as the Fallen Heroes Ride, a motorcycle poker run raising funds specifically for the families of fallen first-responders, an annual Golf Tournament that has gone from raising a few thousand dollars to over \$80,000, as well as hosting the station's annual holiday parties each December. The Boosters also sponsor the Baker-to-Vegas run, and purchase a variety of equipment each month for the Palmdale and Lancaster stations. They also led the fundraising effort for the Fallen Heroes Memorial located at the Antelope Valley Mall.

Over the last few years, the Antelope Valley has been especially hard hit by illegal, organized crime run cannabis grows. In the summers of 2021 and 2022, the Sheriff's Department led a massive two-week effort to root out hundreds of illegal grows with the assistance of the DEA and National

Guard. When the County of Los Angeles wouldn't allocate public works staff and equipment to assist, the City of Lancaster sent their staff and equipment miles outside of their city limits to provide support.

Vice Mayor Crist and Boosters volunteers personally delivered thousands of dollars in meals and refreshments each day for the hundreds of law enforcement personnel working in the desert heat.

"These grows are absolutely an existential threat to our quality of life. They were outside our city limits, but affecting the safety of every resident. Unfortunately, despite 270 arrests by deputies, the District Attorney didn't file one prosecution related to the grows," explained Crist. "Despite that, we're sending a message that we won't allow this in our community and are grateful for each and every deputy in our community."

Vice Mayor Crist continues to make public safety a top priority and has spoken with those in other parts of the county about replicating the Antelope Valley Sheriff's Boosters model. "It's not easy, but when you bring the right people together you can accomplish great things," concluded Crist.

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

DEPUTY JONATHAN BUCHAN

Many of you may have worked with Deputy Buchan during the past several months since he arrived here at Century Station, maybe as a partner, or as a sister car, or maybe just speaking with him while grabbing chow or debriefing a call. Whatever the case, I'm sure it was evident to you that he was a very humble man, a partner you could count on, a quiet professional. I want to share with you the Jonathan Buchan I know, the Jonathan, at one point in my life, I fought alongside, faced evil with, the man I trusted with my life, the man I depended on. Jonathan Buchan, the man, on numerous occasions ensured myself and other Marines, made it through the mission and eventually home to our families.

I'm sharing this with you because it's been weighing heavy on my heart these past couple of days and I don't want his great character, accomplishments and life to be overshadowed by the way he chose to leave

In 2010, I was activated to deploy to Afghanistan. I was part of a Marine Anglico Fire Support Team. I was the team Forward Observer. It was myself, a radio operator and a team leader, Officer Watson, who was Gunny Watson at the time. In early June of 2010, my Anglico team was attached to Bravo Company, 1st Recon Bn to provide fire support for a mission that would insert us into a place called Trek Nawa, a Taliban stronghold just east of Marjah in Helmand Province. It was called Operation Cobra. The mission objective was to disrupt, attack and kill the enemy who were continuously

attacking the Marines, ISAF personnel and civilians in Marjah.

We were inserted by helo in the predawn hours of a warm quiet Afghan morning, and as each wave of helos touched down, all hell broke loose. For the first 30 days we were strictly foot mobile, we took over compounds and dominated key terrain, disrupting, neutralizing and killing the enemy. Of course it wasn't without risk and danger. During this mission, part 1 and part 2, we were targeted, ambushed, RPG'd, and IED'd.

This is when I met Jonathan, a Marine we all depended on. The Marine that always helped you up when you fell, the giant Marine that would be waiting on the other side of a wide canal, ready to catch you when you leaped across for dear life. Jonathan, the Marine who boosted your morale when things quickly became kinetic and you saw him next to you engaging the enemy with supreme accuracy.

The Marine that is responsible for ensuring many of us made it back home to our families. Jonathan and his Recon brothers were absolute warfighters, the epitome and definition of what it means to be a Gung Ho Marine, men you would go anywhere with. Jonathan with the spirit of the Old Breed fought courageously both day and night. Not once did he ever complain about the 130 degree + weather, thirst, hunger and especially the burden of the 80 + lbs. of gear and ammo he humped. In fact, from the look of it, he appeared as if he welcomed it. Jonathan, a dependable Marine who always covered your six, was unselfish, extremely disciplined and humble, and always displayed Esprit de Corps.



That is the Jonathan I know. That is the Jonathan I will always remember and hold in my heart. That is the Jonathan I am indebted to. Jonathan, the giant warrior who walked among us.

His death is tragic, and for reasons we may never know, or understand, he left. This tragic loss is a reminder that, as active and reserve military, military veterans and law enforcement officers, we may not be able to change how society perceives us today, and it's clear this world is rapidly changing. Remembering the one thing that should be constant, and never change, is our ability and desire to stand with each other, and to support and stand with the families of our fallen.

So let's stand in solidarity with the Buchan family. They have my love and appreciation for allowing me the honor and privilege of knowing the man who was Jonathan.

Deputy Jonathan Buchan passed on the morning of January 20, 2023. Deputy Buchan was assigned to the Century Station and joined the department in 2019 after serving two tours in Afghanistan. Detective Eric Espinoza worked alongside Deputy Buchan at Century and served in Afghanistan with him in 2010.



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SENATE BILL 2 (SB 2) CREATES POLICE DECERTIFICATION PROCESS AND EXPANDS CIVIL LIABILITY EXPOSURE

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW...

Senate Bill 2 ("SB 2") was signed into law in 2021 with most of the significant provisions taking effect on January 1, 2023. It also amended Civil Code section 52.1, known as the Tom Bane Civil Rights Act. SB 2 significantly affects law enforcement agencies across the state with the stated intent to increase accountability for misconduct by peace officers and makes five significant changes:

- ▶ Creates a process for the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training ("POST") to revoke certifications for peace officers such that those individuals will be disqualified from peace officer employment in California;
- ▶ Requires law enforcement agencies to investigate all complaints or claims of serious misconduct by peace officers regardless of whether the subject officer(s) is still employed by the agency;
- ▶ Expands the list of circumstances that will disqualify a person from employment as a peace officer;
- ▶ Requires law enforcement agencies to report to POST all complaints, claims, allegations, and findings of serious misconduct;
- ▶ Removes some immunity provisions for peace officers and their employing agencies in civil rights lawsuits brought under the Tom Bane Civil Rights Act.

SB2 CREATES THREE DISTINCT BODIES THAT INVESTIGATE SERIOUS MISCONDUCT AND PROSECUTE ACTIONS TO REVOKE OR SUSPEND PEACE OFFICERS' CERTIFICATION:

PEACE OFFICERS STANDARDS ACCOUNTABILITY DIVISION:

- ▶ Reviews investigations of peace officers by the employing law enforcement ageny and other bodies and conducts additional investigations, as necessary.
- ▶ The Division may also inititate its own investigations
- ▶ Determines whether a peace officer committed "serious misconduct" and presents findings and recommendations to the Advisory Board the POST Commission for suspension or revocation.

PEACE OFFICER STANDARDS ACCOUNTABILITY ADVISORY BOARD:

Primary objective is to "make recommendations on the decertification" to the POST Commission.

▶ Made up of nine (9) members: two (2) current or former peace officers; other seven (7) consists of - 2 members of the public with experience in police accountability issues working at nonprofit or academic institutions, one of which is appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly; 2 members of the public with experience in police accountability issues working in community-based organizations, one of which is appointed by the Senate Rules Committee; 2 additional members of the public with "strong consideration"

given to individuals who have been subject to wrongful use of force by a peace officer or surviving family members of a person killed by wrongful use of force by a peace officer; one attorney with professional experience involving oversight of police officers.

•If the Board finds there is clear and convincing evidence of serious misconduct, it may make a recommendation to the POST Commission for the suspension or revocation of a law enforcement officer's certification.

POST COMMISSION (POST):

Reviews the Board's recommendation and can adopt only upon a two-thirds majority vote. POST identified 15 factors to guide its decision, including:

- ▶ harm caused, peace officer's prior discipline, likelihood of recurrence, and other aggravating or mitigating factors.
- ▶ If the Commission decides to take action against a peace officer's certification, the matter is referred to an Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) for a formal hearing governed by the Administrative Procedures Act.
- ▶ This hearing is a full-blown evidentiary hearing where POST bears the burden of proof by clear and convincing evidence.
- ▶ The final decision by the Commission can be appealed to Superior Court.

HOW THE COMMISSION RECEIVES COMPLAINTS OF "SERIOUS MISCONDUCT" AND COMMENCES AN INVESTIGATION:

Under SB2, the Commission can receive complaints directly from members of the public. Moreover, effective January 1, 2023, the employing agency must begin to report to the Commission within 10 days all of the following:

- ▶ Any complaint or allegation made against an officer that could result in suspension or revocation of an officer's certification.
- ▶ Any finding or recommendation by a civilian oversight entity, including a civilian review board, civilian police commission, police chief or civilian inspector general, that an officer engaged in conduct subject to suspension or revocation.
- ▶ The final disposition of an investigation that determines an officer engaged in conduct that could result in suspension or revocation of certification, regardless of the discipline imposed.
- ▶ Any civil judgment or court finding against a peace officer, or settlement of a civil claim against a peace officer or an agency based on allegations of officer conduct that could render a peace officer subject to suspension or revocation of certification.
- ▶ Further, by July 1, 2023, an employing agency must report to POST these same categories of "events" dating back to January 1, 2020.
- ▶ POST may take action against a peace officer's certification for any act of serious misconduct committed after January 1, 2022 or in cases where the act of serious misconduct was committed before January 1, 2022, the employer made a final determination after January 1, 2022. Lastly, for acts of serious misconduct consisting of dishonesty, sexual assault and use of deadly force that resulted in death or serious bodily injury, POST can take action without limitation as to when the act occurred.
